Having worked with patients and community organizations for over a decade, Charlotte works at the VT Dept of Health in the Division of Family and Child Health as the Family and Community Partnerships Program Manager. Charlotte is also the founder of "The Partnership Collective", a consulting practice that supports healthcare organizations in building equitable patient and family-centered care programs. The training Charlotte received from Human Impact Partners and the Institute for Patient and Family-Centered Care informs and guides her work, as does the lived experience of partners and community power building organizations. Some of Charlotte's current work includes advising organizations on how to develop compensation policies for community members with lived expertise; co-creating promising practices guidance for equitably engaging community members and community power building organizations and building relationships with organizations that support parents and children.

Bryce Starr (M.S.) is the Project Coordinator for the Missouri Maternal Health Action Network at the University of Missouri – Kansas City, Institute for Human Development. Bryce has an Associate of Arts in Nursing, Associate of Science in Nursing, and a Bachelor of Science in Sport and Exercise Science – Human Performance. Bryce is also a Certified Wellness Practitioner through the National Wellness Institute. Bryce is the former Coordinator for Fitness and Wellness at the University of Houston-Clear Lake (UHCL), and most recently the Research and Project Coordinator for Internal Medicine at the University of Texas: Health Science Center of Houston (UTHealth), McGovern Medical School. His work at IHD focuses on improving behavioral health outcomes for mothers, children and families affected by perinatal substance use. He is actively involved in facilitating collaboration and partnership, fostering co-learning and capacity building among partners and those with lived experiences, and works to develop strategic action plans and recommendations to foster effective cross-system collaborations and address barriers preventing mothers affected by perinatal substance use from receiving needed services.

Building Bright Futures (BBF) is Vermont's early childhood public-private partnership, charged under Vermont Title 33 § Chapter 46 and the Federal Head Start Act (Public Law 110-134) as Vermont's Early Childhood State Advisory Council (SAC), the mechanism used to advise the Governor and Legislature on the well-being of children in the prenatal period through age 8 and their families. BBF maintains the vision and strategic plan for Vermont's early childhood system. BBF's Network infrastructure includes 12 Regional Councils, seven VECAP Committees, and the State Advisory Council.
