Sharron Harrington - Executive Director, VT Association for the Education of Young Children

For more than twenty-five years, Sharron has worked within the early childhood education ecosystem. In May of 2023, Sharron stepped into the role of Executive Director after serving on the VTAEYC Board for five years. Prior to joining VTAEYC, she held numerous positions at the local and state level, including a literacy mentor for family child programs, a toddler and preschool educator in a nationally accredited early childhood education program, a Resource Development and Referral Specialist supporting families seeking child care referrals and coordinating professional development for early childhood educators. Most recently, she worked as the Senior Programs Manager for Southern Vermont at Let's Grow Kids leading a team who provide coaching and technical assistance for increasing child care capacity and quality improvement, advocating for systems change, and growing the early childhood workforce. Prior to her career in early childhood education, she operated her own small business and worked in advertising. Erin Roche - Director, First Children's Finance Vermont

Erin Roche is the Director of First Children's Finance Vermont, a national nonprofit committed to growing the supply and business sustainability of excellent child care. Erin started the FCF Vermont office in early 2023, and has led the Vermont team through this critical time of Act 76 implementation. Janet McLaughlin - Deputy Commissioner, Child Development Division, VT Department for Children & Families

Janet McLaughlin has served as the Deputy Commissioner for the Child Development Division at the Department for Children and Families since March 2023. In this role, she has responsibilities for Vermont's child care system in early childhood education and afterschool settings, Children's Integrated Services and Universal Prekindergarten (in partnership with Agency of Education). From 2021 to 2023, she served as the Executive Director for the Vermont Association for the Education of Young Children (VTAEYC). Prior to VTAEYC, Janet worked at the intersection of programs and policy in Vermont's early childhood education system while serving as Chief Programs Officer, interim CEO, and Chief Operating Officer at Let's Grow Kids.
