


### **Study overview:**

- Learn about how recent changes to child care subsidies (called the Child Care Financial Assistance Program, or CCFAP, in VT) have impacted equal access to child care
- Surveys and focus groups, administrative child care data
- Study is informed by ongoing feedback from families and providers

## Focus group sample







### 2022

### **>** JULY

- Family eligibility increases to 350% of the federal poverty line (FPL)
- Increased base reimbursement rates and raised tiered rates for STARS
- Co-payments waived for families at 150% FPL
- Single co-payment implemented for families at 350% FPL

### 2023

### > JULY

· Reimbursement rates increased, and no longer based on a programs' STARS level

#### **▶** SEPTEMBER

 Readiness payment program established, distributing extra money to programs that accept CCFAP families

### **▶** DECEMBER

Reimbursement rates increase an additional 35%

### 2024

### **▶** APRIL

- Family eligibility increases to 400% FPL
- Co-payments waived for families at 175% FPL

### > JUNE

- · Reimbursement rates increase for family child care home programs
- New eligibility category added for non-citizen residents

### **▶** OCTOBER

- Family eligibility increases to 575% FPL
- · Educators can receive increased professional development bonuses

# In their voices: Parents' and administrator' experiences with CCFAP

"Just having the one on one of [eligibility specialist] pulling up the file and highlighting the things...[meeting with them] in person you kind of know what we're going to do. And there is the set meeting time saying we're going to do this now."

"I just love that we can allow families to use our program if they can't afford it...We hadn't had anyone use CCFAP for about two years, but we have some now."

"That money [CCFAP and UPK funding] is not 'extra money' because we know we haven't been paid enough and we need more materials. We're so use to scraping by with so little, the increase [in CCFAP reimbursement rate] is getting closer to reflecting the actual cost of care..."

## Areas for improvement

### Parents/caregivers:

- Challenges finding available slots for child care
- Confusion over copayments and rate changes (e.g., families with multiple children, children in pre-k)
- ECE Providers charging extra fees or increasing rates
- Challenges gathering needed documents for CCFAP application/renewal (e.g., parents who were self-employed or working part-time)
- Language barriers

### **ECE Administrators:**

- Unsure how to handle the family share payment when a family has children and multiple programs
- Challenges helping parents and caregivers with the CCFAP application

## Impacts of changes to CCFAP

**Administrators and parents/caregivers** reported numerous positive impacts of the recent changes to CCFAP:

### **Families**

- More families receive subsidies
- More children in care
- ECE is more affordable
- Reduced stress
- Increased access for immigrant families


## ECE workforce

- Bonuses
- Increased pay
- Benefits: health insurance, dental insurance, life insurance, short-term disability to cover parental leave


## ECE programs

- More stable enrollment.
- Reliable funding/ financial stability


### **Number of Families in Vermont Receiving Subsidies**




### **Number of Child Care Slots Over Time**
